A BRIEF HISTORY

For more than 200 years, the Fairmount Water Works (FWW) has been a leading symbol of technological innovation, and a cultural destination. It operated as a pumping station from 1815-1909, an aquarium from 1911 to 1962, and as the Kelly Natatorium (pool) until 1972. Today, FWW is an award-winning leader in urban environmental education, and serves as Philadelphia Water's public education destination. The Fairmount Water Works has continually found ways of telling the story of our connection with water through: interactive, user-friendly exhibits and programs about water in our world; out-of-school time programs for all ages; weekend hands-on science programs for families; and guided tours of the landmark and its surroundings that explore its past, present, and future impact.

GUIDED TOURS

We offer guided tours that explore the past, present, and future impact of this national historic landmark and its surroundings. Here are just a few tours that reinforce Philadelphia's story of ingenuity and beauty.

- **River Reimagined:** After a brief tour of the Fairmount Water Works, stroll through the beautifully landscaped South Garden, and along the Schuylkill Banks for a 1.5 mile walk to the Walnut Street dock to board a boat for a one-hour narrated cruise.
- **Hills of the Wissahickon:** Tromp the wooded valley of the Wissahickon and Monoshone Creeks, and learn the history, engineering, and ecology of several special sites. Your guide will put all these sites into a context of the larger Schuylkill River watershed and the urban water use cycle.
- **Falling Waters of the Schuylkill:** Choose from one of four fascinating Schuylkill River natural and historic sites and we will customize a walking tour for your group of 6 - 15 people. Learn about the connection of the original Schuylkill Navigation dams with the urban water cycle locally, and with the City of Philadelphia's landmark water system.

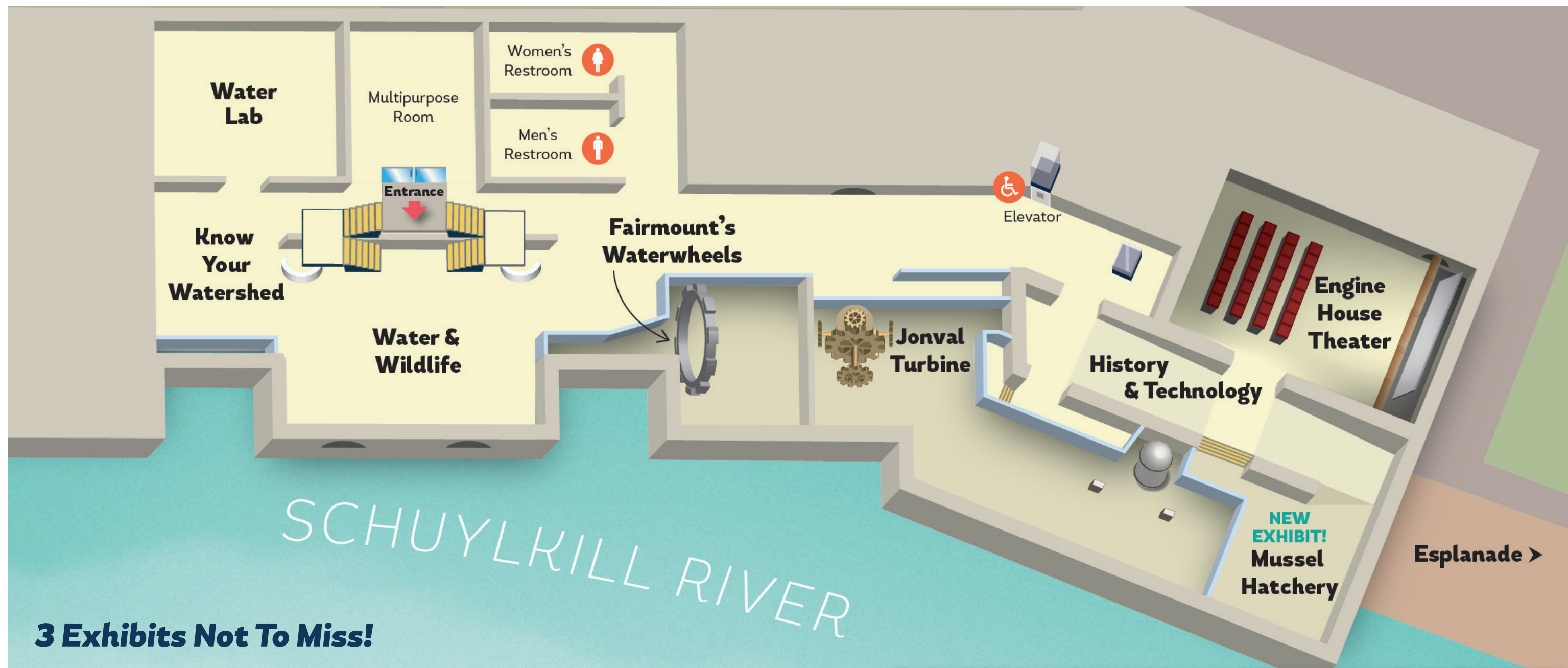


Science Saturdays Activity
